**CATHOLICS COMING HOME** Do you know someone who has been away from the Church for a while? Most of us do not have to look very far to find away Catholics in our circle of family and friends. Many of us are concerned about these loved ones, but we do not know how to help them. Obviously, most of them are searching, but how can we help them find their way home?

As baptized, practicing Catholics, we have a precious gift of faith and love from the Lord that we need to share with our away brothers and sisters. First, we need to pray for them. Next, we need to extend a personal invitation to them to come home to the Catholic Church. Many away Catholics are waiting for an invitation to return. For a variety of reason, they think that the church has excommunicated them and does not welcome their return.

Many away Catholics carry with them a tremendous amount of guilt and misinformation about the Church and are afraid of approaching the Church for fear of being rejected. You can make a tremendous difference in someone's life simply by reaching out to them and telling them that we miss them and would like for them to come back home to our Church family.

At St. Rose of Lima we have a special process to help away Catholics return to the Church entitled "Catholics, Come Home." This process starts Sunday, March 14 and continues March 21 and 28, in the school reading room, at 3:00 P.M. These sessions help returning Catholics learn how they may return to the church. ### **Healing and Reconciliation: A Communal Response to the Abuse of Our Children within Our Church**

We know of the Gospel story of the boy possessed by demons and the disciples' inability to expel the evil one. Only Jesus is able to do so after the confession of trust and faith on the part of the boy's father. When the disciples question their inability to cure the boy Jesus' response resounds even today when we modern day followers are unable to stop or cure an evil such as the sexual abuse of children. "This kind (of evil) you can drive out only by prayer." (Mk 9:29.)

As a household of faith, we are challenged to profess our own confession of trust and faith. Through our prayer, through our faith-filled actions we can influence the healing process of all those who have been injured by sexual abuse of children. All are invited to join together as a household of faith in praying for healing, peace and reconciliation not only in regard to the sexual abuse of children but for all the ways that we each inflict harm upon another. Penance Services will be held at 7 p.m. on March 29 at Good Shepherd Parish in State College, on March 30 at Most Holy Trinity Parish in Huntington, on March 31 at Blessed Sacrament Cathedral in Altoona and on April 1 at St. John Gualbert Cathedral in Johnstown. Let us gather together in communal sorrow and seek healing, peace and sacramental reconciliation.

### **ALMSGIVING: A LESSON IN LOVE**

Saint Basil the Great wrote, "Anyone working . . . ought to do work not so much for the satisfaction of his own needs by his efforts, as to fulfill the commandment of the Lord who said: 'I was hungry and you gave me food' (Matthew 25:35). . . . The aim which everyone ought to have in working is to help the needy, more than to provide for oneself." This is a challenge for those of us who are citizens of one of the wealthiest nations in history. We work hard, juggling the demands of career and family, but how many of us are working primarily to help the needy?

The lenten discipline of almsgiving challenges us to follow the example of Christ, who gave not his spare change or his leftovers, but his very life. If our work is to be more Christ-like, it must involve a giving of self in service to humankind. It must cost us and bless others. This is a challenge, but one that reaps great rewards for us as well as for others. If we work not for our own satisfaction but to provide for the needs of the poor and to emulate Christ, we are unlikely to suffer from burnout or boredom. Even the most mundane chores become meaningful.

Have a family meeting and discuss how your family can work for others this Lent. Make a household alms box, bless it using the blessing on this page, and, before family meals or prayers, put money earned for the poor into the box.

## **SAINT JOHN OF GOD**

Patron saint of nurses and the sick, Saint John was born in Portugal in 1495. When he converted, around the age of 40, he was, at first, considered a lunatic and was confined. After he was released, he spent his life caring for the poor and sick. Saint Paul tells us, "God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom" (1 Corinthians 1:25). Am I willing to do the will of God even if it makes me look foolish or crazy in the eyes of the world? Pray today for healers and those who need healing.

## **SOWING JUSTICE**

The Hebrew word for almsgiving, *tzedakah*, literally means "righteousness." The book of Hosea says, "Sow in righteousness; reap steadfast love." Rabbi Eleazar, in the Babylonian Talmud, teaches, "Almsgiving becomes increasingly perfect according to the amount of love that is shown in it." Almsgiving, according to the Torah and teachings of Jesus, is not an act of pity but of justice. If we sow justice, we shall reap love. In addition to giving alms, look for opportunities to sow justice. Do you know anyone who's been unjustly accused or mistreated? Who hasn't gotten their fair share of love? Is there anything you can do to help right a wrong?

## **LENTEN READING**

Saint Benedict considered lenten reading important. His *Rule*, a guide to monastic life, allows for monks to receive a book from the library at the beginning of Lent. He stipulates that the book should be read "consecutively and straight through." If we want deep spiritual roots, we need to study our faith. Choose a book to read this Lent as an individual, a couple, or a family. If we emulate, not the dilettantes who skim through life, picking out what pleases them, but farmers who are willing to till the soil, our reading is sure to reap a bountiful harvest come Easter.

## **PRETZELS**

An early Christian lenten food, pretzels are easy and fun to make. They were originally called *brezel*, from *bracellae*, "little arms," because they are shaped in the form of two arms crossed in prayer. Proof 1 pkg. active dry yeast with 1 Tbs. sugar in 1½ cups luke-warm (100–110°) water. Mixture should bubble. Stir in 1 tsp. salt and 4 cups flour. On floured board, knead in ½ cup more flour. Knead about 8 minutes. Divide into pieces, roll into ropes, and shape into pretzels. Let rise. Preheat oven to 425°. Place pretzels on greased cookie sheet. Brush with mixture of 1 egg yolk mixed with 2 Tbs. water, and sprinkle with kosher salt. Bake 12 minutes or until golden brown.

## **FRIDAY ABSTINENCE**

On the Fridays of Lent, Catholics 14 and older abstain from meat, recalling the suffering and death of Jesus on the first Good Friday. The bishops of the United States have encouraged voluntary abstinence on Fridays throughout the year for world peace. This Lent, start a family tradition of praying for peace before your Friday meal.

## **HEAVEN'S JOY**

Today's gospel tells us of the great joy there will be in heaven over a single sinner who repents. Repentance begins with conversion of heart. The church teaches that the human heart is converted; that is, turned away from sin and toward God, by "looking on the one whom our sins have pierced" (Zechariah 12:10, John 19:37). As you turn your heart toward God this Lent, try praying before a crucifix or an icon of the crucifixion.

This web site is an additional way to distribute information and more importantly, to bring our faith community together; it will not replace any current methods.

As I introduce the various topics to you, please bear with me for a bit while I also explain how to navigate (move) through a web site for those who may not know.

When the site opens, to the left is a series of topics called a Navigational Menu. This menu also appears across the bottom of every page. The Parish Menu includes: Saint Rose of Lima, Parish Life, Prayer Requests, On The Calendar, Photo Album, Thank You, Saint Rose School, Links of Interest, Fun and Games, Search This Site, Contact Us, and Site Map. These are links you click on that will lead you to the various pages within the site. Additionally, there are titles on each page, with underlined words (called hyperlinks or links for short) below them. Simply find a topic of interest, click on the link, and then read all about it! It's that easy.

To view pages that relate specifically to the school, in either the left or bottom Navigational Menu find the link "Saint Rose School" and click on it. These pages are in the same format as the parish but are devoted to the school. The School Menu includes: Saint Rose School, Classrooms, Extracurricular, Calendars, Fund Raising, Councils / Assoc, Saint Rose Parish, Educational Links, Search This Site, Contact Us, and Site Map.
