Break the cycle of poverty Build community

As individuals and as families, Americans cherish the right to have a safe haven to call home. Many of us take for granted that we will live in welcoming and healthy communities with other people who respect our values. For some 34.5 million Americans, poverty makes that expectation more a dream than a reality.

When people share an idea and a goal, they can work together to overcome crippling problems by building community with each other. For 35 years, Catholics have encouraged the efforts of small groups of poor and low-income people to improve conditions in their lives and their communities. They have put their faith into action, through support for the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD), so that others can also live in decent, safe neighborhoods.

A place to call home. In the Liberty City neighborhood of Miami, African American residents were surprised to learn that a county effort to “reinvigorate” their community required the demolition of 1,000 low-income housing units. The developers envisioned 90 mixed-income apartments on the site. The plan was approved without input from the local people who would be displaced and made no provision for their relocation.

These residents turned to the *Miami Worker’s Center*, an organizing and advocacy group for low-wage workers that is supported by CCHD. The Center went to court and won an injunction to block the demolition. During the next few years, the Center reached an agreement with the local housing authority to increase the number of new units to 450 and to give priority for the new housing to Liberty City residents, who otherwise would have been displaced. They also secured immediate spots in other affordable housing for those Liberty City residents who did not qualify for the new housing units.

Saving the family farm. In Iowa, eight local churches banded together in the mid-1970s to encourage public officials to make their low- and moderate-income neighborhoods safe for growing families in urban Waterloo. With help from CCHD, *Iowa Citizens*

for Community Improvement (CCI) succeeded in persuading local banks to lend money to aspiring homeowners and to discontinue the practice of “redlining,” or arbitrarily denying a loan because a particular piece of property might be located in a marginal area of town.



Iowa CCI grew and developed as the needs of its members evolved. CCHD supported the group’s expansion into rural Iowa, where it has taken a leading role in advocating for the preservation of family farms. By insisting on enforcement of existing water and air pollution laws, and by pressing for local control of zoning and placement of new animal processing factories, Iowa CCI tries to help family farmers to remain competitive with larger, corporate-owned farms.

CCHD supports groups like the Miami Workers Center and the Iowa Citizens for Community Improvement to identify and achieve just solutions to situations that trap people in lives of poverty. As people of faith, we believe that poverty can be overcome by building community. 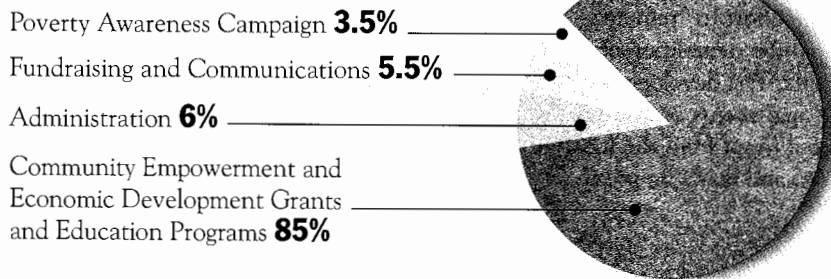
CCHD encourages Catholics to grow in their faith and work for justice for and with those who are poor and vulnerable. Its educational resources include prayer, retreat, and faith

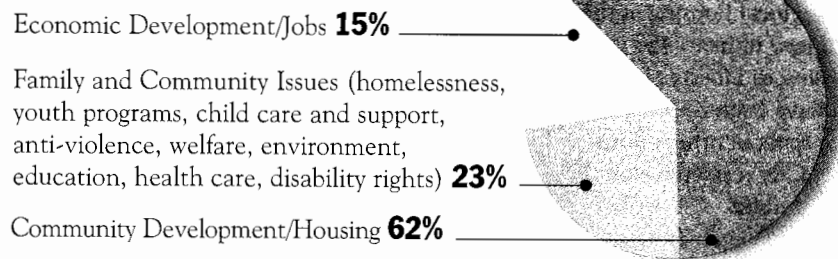
