George Baker opened the meeting with a prayer.

The minutes of December 2, 2004 were approved.

Committee Reports

Liturgy

Father Crookston reported the following for Sue Cossitor, Chairperson of the Liturgical Commission, who was attending the "Protecting God's Children for Adults" at Bishop Guilfoyle Senior High School:

The Liturgy Commission has decided that instead of doing two Good Friday services at 12:00 noon and 7:00 PM, there will be one service at 12:00 noon which is found in the missalette consisting of Liturgy of the Word, Veneration of the Cross, and Holy Communion. Instead of repeating the same service at 7:00 PM, there will be a Tenebrae service which consists of readings, and some singing of psalms. Tenebrae is a service based on the Liturgy of the Hours. Sue and Bryce Cossitor are currently in the process of putting the service together. For those parishioners who may not know exactly what a Tenebrae service is, some

educating of the service is going to be provided before Good Friday.

St. Rose Parish Penance Service will be Sunday, March 13 at 4:00 PM.

The Liturgy Commission is exploring the interest of the Greek Orthodox Church and the 58th Street United Methodist Church in having an Ecumenical Service sometime after Easter.

The repository that is set up for Holy Thursday in the Maria Parish Center will utilize the stage this year instead of the corner of the gym. Last year, having it at floor level on a table was not high enough. Also, lighting was a problem. By moving it to the stage, it is believed that those problems will be eliminated.

As per the announcements at Mass the past few weeks, the Children's Choir resumes on February 19th at 9:30 AM. A letter from the director, Bryce Cossitor, has been mailed to the parents of the children who sang for Christmas Eve. It is hoped that all 32 children will return, plus the Children's Choir is always looking for new members.

Education

Parish School: Pat Ronan reported the following: Catholic Schools Week, January 30 – February 4, was a huge success. This year's theme was "Faith in Every Student". There were several activities celebrating the week including two beautiful liturgies which began and ended the week.

The students will pray the Stations of the Cross each Thursday during Lent at 1:25 PM in the church. It is open to everyone.

Each student has been given a Lenten mite box. Last year \$728.00 was raised from the boxes for the Holy Childhood Association, and this year the school is hoping to match or exceed that amount.

Student Council raised \$320.00 to help the tsunami victims. The money was sent to Catholic Relief Services.

Kindergarten registration is set for February 28. Pre school registration will be sometime in March. The exact date has not yet been determined.

The Home and School Association is having a Longaberger Basket Bingo on February 28. Tickets are available in the school office.

Updated school management software from Parish Data Systems was installed in the school offices in January.

Catechesis

No report was given.

Other

Pat Irwin suggested that some thought be given to educate parents about the financial aid plans available for those wanting their children to attend parochial school. Pat Ronan did indicate that this year, applications were sent to every family in the parish with children.

Tom Goss indicated that often times there seems not to be enough *Precious Blood* available for all parishioners to partake at the 10:30 Mass. Father Crookston made note and will see that an adjustment is made.

Finance

Stewardship Renewal: Father Crookston reported that the Stewardship Committee is in the process of collecting census data as well as time, talent, and ministry information from parishioners.

Saint Rose Endowment Follow-up: Designs to establish a Saint Rose Endowment Plan is moving forward. A sub committee of the parish council will meet on April 7 to further discuss how to proceed with the plan. Any parishioner interested in helping to start an endowment plan may contact any of the following council members: Adam Trybus, Sr., Joe Eberhardt, Tom Goss, Pat Ronan, or Father Crookston.

Sound System: The Audio Enhancement Task Force is in the process of receiving proposals for a new sound system for the church. Once a proposal is approved, it will be given out for bid.

Maintenance

George Baker reported that an assessment of building and grounds will be made in the near future.

Family Life/Activities

Judy Rossi reported that portraits are being taken for the Saint Rose Pictorial Directory. Many volunteers have helped to bring this project to fruition. The directory will probably be available around mid-June.

Social Justice

No report was given.

Old Business

Father Crookston reported that the Appreciative Inquiry Action Plans have been divided into three parts: (1) Action Plans which have been addressed; (2) Action Plans which are in the process of being addressed; and (3) Action Plans which have not been addressed. The plans which have been addressed are: the pictorial directory, the Ministry Fair, Lunch and Learn, and the stewardship phone appeal for the Annual Catholic Campaign. Plans in the process of being addressed are: the maintenance assessment, the signing out of library books from a library cart after all masses, the training of liturgical ministers, the parish census, and the formation of committed volunteers to various parish ministries. Plans not addressed are: post-confirmation catechesis, the youth group, a parish yard sale, a welcoming committee for new parish members, and the recruiting and training of catechists.

COMING TO KNOW JESUS

The unnamed woman at the well in John's Gospel today (4:5-42) is often understood as a sinner, but Jesus never identifies her as such. The story says only that she is a Samaritan. The disciples who return to him see only that she is a woman. Her sinfulness, if any, is a side issue. What is important is the woman's ability to tell Jesus honestly who she is. As their dialogue continues, Jesus declares who he is. He finds the woman's faith in a coming messiah so sure that he reveals himself as the one she is waiting for. She is unable to contain the news and proclaims it to the townspeople. Because of her testimony, the people flock to Jesus to see for themselves who he is. The Samaritan woman becomes the evangelizer who sows what the disciples will reap.

Throughout John's Gospel, women often take the role of preacher, apostle, and bearer of Good News: a woman declares Jesus as Messiah (John 11) and a woman becomes the first witness to the Resurrection (John 20). The contributions of these women are integrally woven into the Gospel story. Even now, men and women share the discipleship of Jesus. They are partners in spreading the Gospel throughout the world. Jesus called all people to share this task, and Lent is a good time for remembering that our fellow travelers are of every size, race, and station in life. They are the people who have heard the call of Jesus and followed. On the way, the best thing we can do is pray for one another.

This Week at Home

Monday, February 28

RECOGNIZING JESUS

In Luke's Gospel today (4:24–30), the townspeople of Nazareth have serious doubts that Jesus has been sent by God to "bring glad tidings to the poor." By the time Jesus finishes his speech, the people who had been praising him a little earlier now seek to hurl him off a cliff. Confronted with a new idea or shown that the world doesn't operate according to our desires, we too may react with anger. With God's grace, we can stay open and discern the new ways in which God is working.

Tuesday, March 1

FORGIVENESS FROM THE HEART

Among the main themes of Lent are the twin pillars of reconciliation and forgiveness. Today's parable of the unforgiving servant (Matthew 18:21–35) tells what happens when we fail to forgive others. Forgiving someone else is hard and forgiving ourselves is nearly impossible, but remember that God forgives us first. That gift gives us strength and courage to forgive others and ourselves. Think of someone you need to forgive. During the rest of Lent, pray for the grace of forgiveness.

Wednesday, March 2

ANTICIPATE SPRING

By the beginning of March in many areas, people are weary of winter and ready for spring. As an anticipation of spring, plant flower seeds in small pots and place them in the window. Every day, remind yourself that a lot of growth takes place where you can't see it, under the ground. With a little care, by Easter, these flowers will bloom.

Thursday, March 3

KATHARINE DREXEL

Blessed Katharine Drexel was born into a wealthy family in late-nineteenth-century America and inherited part of a huge trust fund. Katharine felt a particular mission to Native American and African American families. She founded the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament and took a vow of personal poverty, but continued to administer her share of the

trust. Her generosity helped fund the Bureau of Catholic Indian Missions and schools on reservations. She also helped found Xavier University of New Orleans, the first Catholic College established for black students.

Friday, March 4

TREE BARK CROSSES

The end of winter is a good time to find the rough bark that comes from trees battered by wind and snow. Find two good pieces of thick bark (oak or maple trees do nicely). Form a cross and lash the pieces together with a leather strip or some twine so that it forms an X in the center of the cross. Bring the ends together in the back and tie or nail them to the cross with a carpet tack. Put your cross where it will remind you of Christ's sacrifices and encourage you in your Lenten practices.

Saturday, March 5

THE TAX COLLECTOR'S PRAYER

Luke's Gospel for today (18:9–14) tells the story of two people praying in the temple: a Pharisee who thinks he is more virtuous than "ordinary" people and a tax collector who asks for God's mercy. No one is perfect. How can we think we are better than anyone else? All we can do is our humble best and ask God for mercy for our mistakes. Even with our shortcomings, God loves us beyond measure. Pray the tax collector's prayer today: "Lord, be merciful to me, a sinner."
