- St. Rose School has recently been awarded a \$500 grant from the First Energy Education Grants Program for a collaborative project among the science, math and technology departments. Students in grades five through eight will use this grant to build solar panels outside of the school building. The energy that is collected will be stored in a battery. Variables such as amps, volts and temperature will be measured and recorded daily on wireless laptops. This collection of data will serve as an opportunity for the students to create spreadsheets, write formulas and analyze information. Students also will research and build vehicles that are solar powered.

PROTECTING GOD'S CHILDREN:

How does the diocese insure that anyone who ministers to children is appropriate for such involvement?

The diocese requires that every member of the clergy, religious, all employees and volunteers have a completed application, a background screening, references and are asked to sign a code of conduct. When appropriate, interviews are conducted with persons new to the parish and/or persons who may be unfamiliar with the policies for the protection of children and youth. Each individual is also provided a written copy of the policies. Although this process involves time and effort on the part of the parish, the school and the individual it is viewed as another way to insure that perpetrators of the sexual abuse of children are not unwittingly provided with access to the children of our faith communities.
