REVERENCE

"Eucharistic amazement" is expressed in reverence and in the dignity and care brought to every celebration of Mass. These are attitudes that befit not only the priest and other sacred ministries, but all the baptized. Through Baptism and Confirmation, God has prepared his children to stand in his presence and offer him worship, "Christian," says Saint Leo the Great, "know your dignity" (*Sermon I on the Birth of the Lord*).

The first school of reverence is the home. Children can learn from their earliest years to make the sign of the cross slowly and deliberately, to kneel in adoration, to listen quietly, to stand in attention, and to treat holy things with respect. Adults can show by their example that the Church is the house of God and that the Mass is the holiest of mysteries. In true reverence there is nothing constrained or artificial. Reverence is a joyful and gracious thing, akin to the wonder of one who finds himself face-to-face with a great beauty, or heart-to-heart with a great love. To every word and gesture of the Mass give the imprint of reverence. "I bow down before your holy temple," says the psalmist, "Filled with awe" (Psalm 5:8).

Protecting God's Children. What should I do if a child reveals an experience of abuse to me?

Be open and understanding. Try to stay calm. If you react strongly, the child may stop talking, take back information or internalize this as another reason to feel bad about him or herself.

Understand that the child is probably having mixed feelings.

Often, the perpetrator of sexual abuse is someone close to the child. Although the child may have strong negative feelings about the person's abusive behavior, he or she also may love them for other behaviors.

Believe the child. Children rarely make up stories about sexual abuse. Also, they tend to keep the abuse a secret for a long time because they have been threatened by the perpetrator and repeatedly told the abuse is their own fault. Reassure the child that they are not to blame for what has happened and let them know you will help them.

Forgiveness in the Family

An old song, “Why Do We Hurt the Ones We Love?” points out how prone we are to releasing pent-up emotions, lobbing insults, and indulging in self-pity around those we care about most. Sometimes this is intentional, but more often it is simply careless. This makes forgiveness a family matter that outweighs all others.

Much wisdom about relationships stresses that conflict is unavoidable, so the ability to repair hurts is essential. The willingness to listen, to admit to mistakes, and to seek ways to defuse tension all figure into this reparation.

Lent is a penitential season that invites us to reflect on our need for forgiveness. The sacrament of Penance helps us acknowledge the pain we cause others, restores

relationships, and opens us to God’s pardon and peace. Our faith teaches that sin is a communal reality. It harms others, and we must reconcile with them when we seek God’s mercy (see Rite of Penance, 5). Nowhere is this experienced as intensely as in a family. An argument between two people, for example, affects everyone in the household. The tension is felt at the table, in the car, and around the television. When the breach is repaired, the entire family breathes a sigh of relief.

When we strive to repair the damage done to those we love—through repentant words, loving actions, and forgiving attitudes—we strengthen family life.

Little Lights

"It is better to light one candle than curse the darkness." It can be helpful to hold on to this slogan of the Christopher Society while you're watching the evening news. The media's summary of the day's world and local events can be an overwhelming experience, making us feel as if the small efforts we make toward peace are snuffed out by larger acts of violence. In imitation of Jesus Christ, the light who came into the world to dispel the darkness of sin, let a little flicker of your light pierce the darkness today by extending a simple courtesy to someone else.

Anniversary of the Birthday of Vincent Van Gogh

Artists offer a fresh glimpse of the world by opening our eyes to the wonder of simple things. The luminous paintings of Vincent Van Gogh are an example of such creativity. Embark on a "beauty walk" today. Visit an art museum, hike a nature trail, or stroll through a park. How might you view the world around you with the eyes of an artist? As you do so, offer a prayer of thanksgiving for the wonder of creation and the beauty of those you love.

Friday, March 31

The Chi Rho

In today's Gospel (John 7:1-2, 10, 25-30) we hear the crowds in Jerusalem puzzling over whether Jesus could be the Messiah. To help us ponder the mystery of Jesus'



words about his identity "I am from him," consider the traditional symbol for Christ, the Chi Rho. It is composed of the first two letters of the Greek word for Christ—ΧΡΙΣΤΟΣ, or *Kristos*. The X (chi) and P (rho) are combined to form the symbol. In many Gospel manuscript illuminations, such as the spectacular ninth-century Book of Kells, it decorates the passage describing how God became human through the Holy Spirit (Matthew 1:18), and so provides a visual meditation on Christ's divine and human nature.

Saturday, April 1

A Closer Look at the Penitential Prayer

As part of the Introductory Rites of the Mass, we offer together a penitential prayer in which we acknowledge that we have sinned both in what we have done and in what we have failed to do. Sins of omission sometimes take more reflection as we consider the words we have withheld that can bring comfort and extend forgiveness. Taking a spiritual inventory before going to bed at night reminds us that we can injure others through what we fail to do or say. As a way to end such a reflection, we can ask God for the grace to listen, see, and respond to others with the heart of Christ whose attentiveness to the needs of others was marked with love and compassion.
